## **IT'S SPRING CLEAN-UP TIME!**

Weeds, rocks, overgrown trees and bushes! We do not always like to deal with yard work, but it is something we need to do to keep our community beautiful. This is a reminder to our neighbors both new and old - please maintain your yards on a regular basis. By doing so, it helps keep your yard manageable and looking great.

As the hot summer months approach, now is a perfect time to clean our yards before the temperatures hit the 100's. The following are a few things to do routinely; so, yard work is easier and less of a chore:

- Pull weeds
- Trim bushes
- Prune trees
- Pick-up trash
- Sweep rocks and leaves off driveway, sidewalk and street
- Inspect irrigation system for leaks
- Rake up dead branches and leaves
- Adjust irrigation timers accordingly, more for summer less during winter.
- Replace leaking irrigation drippers

It is always best to work in the early morning and evening hours. If possible, try to work during the coolest part of the day and avoid as much direct sunlight. Don't forget to take water breaks, so you

do not over exert yourself. Make yard work easy by using a wheelbarrow to haul tools and collect tree trimmings and weeds as you work. Finally, make sure to water your plants in the morning and evening hours. Never do so during the hottest part of the day.



Our CCR's dictate that parking should be kept to garages and residential driveways. What this means for residents and our visitors is that we must first utilize the two parking spots in the garage first. If these spots are not available, then use the two spots in the driveway next. Only when all slots in the garage and driveway are occupied, should we then park on the street. If you find it necessary to use this space, please remember to park on the side of the street that allows parking. Never park on the side that prohibits parking, and never park facing the wrong side of the street. Please be courteous to your neighbors by adhering to these simple rules.

Please don't block sidewalks, as they are the means to a nice evening stroll.

Parking on the wrong side of the street means the City can and does issue tickets.

Also be aware that there are thieves in the night. If you park your car in your driveway – keep it locked and the windows closed. Leave nothing of value in sight. It is a good idea to take your garage door remote in the house with you. If you have keyless entry to your vehicle, be aware that if they're kept.to close to a door they can be hacked.

**Trash and Recycling Cans** 

Our CC&R's state that our trash cans are not to be put out before 6:00 p.m. the night before the pickup day (Monday night for Tuesday pickup).

It also states that the cans are to be removed within 24 hours after the pickup up. This means by Wednesday afternoon. They are to be stored beyond the plane of the garage door.

**Recycling** – We are on a bi-weekly pickup. – the B Cycle.

Remember no sorting is required, so fill your Blue Barrel to the brim with:

All plastics – just no plastic bags or Styrofoam

Junk Mail, phone books, catalogs and magazines

Cans – aluminum, steel and tin cans

Paper – newspaper, writing paper, copy paper, brown paper bags

Glass food and beverage bottles and jars.

So, think about what you throw away and ask "Can this be recycled?" Grab more opportunities to recycle and make a difference: help save our desert environment, energy and precious natural resources.
